GCA RULES Keep It Simple

- 1. Please carefully read and follow GCA Flower Show Rules, General Information and Division Guidelines. All rules as stated in *The Garden Club of America Flower Show and Judging Guide*, July 2020 Edition, shall apply.
- 2. All plant material must be correctly identified with the botanical and common names, if possible. Accepted references for nomenclature are:
 - a. AHS A-Z Encyclopedia of Garden Plants,
 - International Plant Names Index at www.ipni.org or www.internationalplantnames.com
 - c. Plant Systematics at www.plantsystematics.org
 - d. Missouri Botanical Garden Plant Finder missouribotanicalgarden.org/plantfinder
- 3. The Garden Club of America expects all exhibitors to be aware of the need to promote conservation of endangered and threatened plants. Plants collected in the wild and listed by the Arkansas Natural Heritage Program may not be exhibited in any flower show sponsored by a GCA club. Cultivated plant material listed by Arkansas's Natural Heritage Program may be exhibited if accompanied by a typed card stating that it has not been collected from the wild or that it was collected out-of-state and giving information concerning its cultural requirements and methods of propagation. Natural Heritage Program lists of endangered plant material

will be available before and during the show from the division chairmen and are available online at http://plants.usda.gov/threat.html

- 4. Plant material showing evidence of insects or disease must be removed immediately from the exhibition area. This rule will be enforced at any time during the show, whenever the problem is identified.
- 5. All entries in the Floral Design Division must include fresh and/or dried plant material. Fresh plant material must be in water or conditioned in such a way as to remain in pristine form while on exhibition. An entry not maintained in show condition may have its award removed. Entries in Photography are required to include plant material.
- Locally invasive plants, diseased plant material, artificial plant material, live animals (including fish), taxidermy, natural birds' nests, feathers of any kind and protected sea life, including coral and animal horns, are not permitted, http://plants.usda.gov/java/noxiousDriver.



GENERAL INFORMATION Easy as ABC

- 1. Entries are open to all Little Rock Garden Club members, including provisionals, and professionals in their disciplines, except as noted in the schedule.
- 2. Registration is required for all floral design, photography, and botanical arts classes. Registration forms are provided at the back of the schedule and are available online. Classes will be filled in the order registration forms are received according to the postmark/email date and time.
- 3. Entering in a show constitutes permission to use images of the submitted content in all GCA channels of communication.
- 4. While the GCA, the LRGC, and the CCLR will exercise due caution in safeguarding exhibits, responsibility for damage, loss or personal injury cannot be assumed.
- 5. Any clarification or change in the rules, as originally stated in the schedule, shall be communicated promptly in writing by the division consultant to all exhibitors in the class and, at the show, to the judges and to the passing committee.
- 6. An entry card must accompany each entry. Entry cards will be available at the show and upon request from the registration or division chairmen, in advance of the show. Entry cards must be completed in black waterproof medium.

- 7. The passing committee must pass each entry before an exhibitor may leave the show area. The passing committee reserves the right to refuse any entry that does not conform to the rules of the schedule. The exhibitor has the option of correcting the entry if time permits. If not corrected, the entry cannot be judged, but may remain in place, marked "For Exhibit Only" with a brief, constructively worded statement explaining why it was not judged. The judges may not disqualify any entry passed by the passing committee unless evidence of insect infestation or disease is identified.
- 8. Once an entry is passed, the exhibitor(s) must immediately leave the show floor. The only exception will be flower show committee members who have entered and been passed according to the timetable. A passed entry may not be touched again by the exhibitor until after judging and then only to carry out necessary maintenance.
- Only participating judges and clerks will be allowed on the show floor during judging. Flower Show Chairmen and division chairman should remain nearby but off the show floor until needed.
- 10. A statement of intent, either optional or required, must be submitted at the time of passing. The statement must be no more than 25 words, typed or printed in black, waterproof medium on a 4"x 6" white, unlined card.
- 11. All exhibits must be removed immediately following the closing of the show.



DIVISION I Easy on the Eyes Floral Design Guidelines

- 1. Please carefully read and follow the GCA Rules, General Information and Timetable for Exhibitors.
- 2. An exhibitor is permitted only one entry per class and may only enter one class. The exhibitor(s) under whose name(s) the entry has been registered must create and complete the design. Each entry is limited to no more than two exhibitors. All participants must be listed. Only listed exhibitors and show personnel may be on the show floor at the time of entry.
- 3. If forced to withdraw, an exhibitor must notify the registration chairman and class consultant and find a substitute unless there is a waiting list for the class.
- 4. Mechanics should not be visible unless they are an integral part of the design.
- 5. Designs may be executed off-site and brought to the show completed.
- 6. Anything not prohibited in the GCA Rules, Floral Design Division Guidelines, or individual class descriptions is permitted.
- 7. Although permitted, the use of cut fruits and vegetables is discouraged and should be undertaken only with proper treatment to prevent spoilage and insect contamination.

- 8. Judging will be based on the principles of design: balance, contrast, dominance, proportion, rhythm and scale; and the elements of design: light, space, line, form, color, texture, pattern and size. Creativity is important, as are distinction, conformance to and interpretation of the class and schedule.
- 9. Accessories are permitted, unless otherwise stated in the class description.
- 10. Pedestals may not be moved. Tops of pedestals may not be enlarged or draped.
- 11. Walls in front of which designs are staged are painted Sherwin-Williams OC-117 with a semi-gloss finish. Pedestals are also painted Sherwin-Williams OC-117.
- 12. A statement of intent must be submitted at the time of passing. The statement must be no more than 25 words, typed or printed in black, waterproof medium on a 4"x 6" white, unlined card.
- 13. Questions regarding class requirements may be directed to the division consultant.
- 14. The scale of points by which designs are to be judged is as follows:

DIVISION I Easy on the Eyes Floral Design Classes

Class 1 Like Water Off a Duck's Back 4 Entries

An underwater design staged on a white pedestal 40" high with a 16" square top in front of a white wall. Viewed from three sides. Design may not exceed 14" from the center of the pedestal in width or depth. No height restriction.

Educational Note: An **Underwater design** is a contemporary design style where all or part of the design must be under visible water. - GCA FS&JG, July 2020 Edition

Class 2 It's Child's Play 4 Entries

A parallel design inspired by a photograph of a *Melissa* and *Doug* stacking toy, staged on a white pedestal 40" high with a 16" square top in front of a white wall. Viewed from three sides. Design may not exceed 14" from the center of the pedestal in width or depth. No height restriction. Photo provided by the flower show committee.

Educational Note: **Parallel Design** a design in which plant material (and other components if not prohibited) are placed in strongly parallel groupings with open space between: may be vertical, horizontal, or diagonal. Additional components may be placed at any angle at the base as connectives. Multiple containers may be used, but design must appear as a single unit. - GCA FS&JG, July 2020 Edition

DIVISION II A Walk in the Park Horticulture Guidelines

- Please carefully read and follow the GCA Rules, General Information and Timetable for Exhibitors.
- 2. Entries must have been owned and grown by the exhibitor for a minimum of three months.
- 3. An exhibitor may submit four entries per class, provided each is a different species or cultivar.
- 4. All entries propagated by the exhibitor must be accompanied by a completed propagation card.
- 5. Mats, stands, saucers, stakes, ties, etc. are not allowed unless otherwise noted in the schedule.
- 6. Classes may be subdivided, and entries moved and/or reclassified at the discretion of the show committee and/or the judges.
- 7. The committee will provide containers and wedging materials for all cut specimens.
- 8. A dot with the entry number on it should be affixed to the container to ensure an entry card, separated from the exhibit container during staging, can be returned to the proper entry before judging.
- 9. For the scale of points by which the classes are to be judged, please refer to the FS&JG Pocket Guide @ the Show, 2020 Edition.

DIVISION II A Walk in the Park Horticulture Classes

Easy Pickings

Section A CUT SPECIMENS (Classes 1 – 11)

One stem, spike or spray not to exceed 28" in length, measured from the lip of the container to the tip of the stem.

Classes 1 – 5 Bulbs and Corms

Educational Note: A bulb is 1. a modified underground stem, which is typically very short, flattened, and surmounted by a group of usually fleshy, non-green, scale-like leaves. Bulbs are sometimes covered by a thin, membranous layer, e.g., onions and tulips, or fibrous and reticulated, tunic e.g., Allium or the scales may be naked, e.g., Lilium. 2. in horticultural classification, corms, tubers or thickened rhizomes may be considered bulbs, which they resemble and have similar cultural requirements. Also see tuberous root. - GCA FS&JG, July 2020 Edition

Educational Note: A corm is a bulb-like, swollen underground stem stored with reserve food, and bearing buds or growing shoots on its surface, e.g., crocus, gladiolus, cyclamen, colchicum. - GCA FS&JG, July 2020 Edition

DIVISION III It's a Snap Photography Guidelines

- Please carefully read and follow the GCA Rules, General Information and the Timetable for Exhibitors.
- 2. An exhibitor may make only one entry in a class and may enter only one class. Registration closes for LRGC members January 20, 2022. Exhibitors will be notified if accepted or not at the time of registration.
- 3. If forced to withdraw, an exhibitor must notify the Division Consultant and find a substitute unless there is a waiting list for the class.
- 4. A photograph previously entered in any GCA, GCA Major and Sanctioned Non-GCA Major Flower Show or a GCA *Focus* online contest may not be entered again even with slight alterations and reprinting. The same photograph may only be entered in one show at a time.
- 5. Each photograph must be the work of the exhibitor, under whose name it is registered. In manipulated photographs, any added imagery must be the work of the exhibitor. Commercial overlays and textures are allowed. Matting, mounting, and printing may be done professionally. All photographs must be 2-dimensional and printed on paper unless otherwise specified. All post-production must be done before the photograph is printed.
- 6. All photographs must be taken with a smartphone.

- 7. Any editing at any stage must be the work of the exhibitor. This includes enhancement for color or clarity, removal of a part of the image, combining images, or distorting the original subject.
- 8. Photography entries are limited to subjects consistent with The Garden Club of America interests such as horticulture, floral design, gardens/landscapes, conservation and the environment, historic preservation, civic improvement and the natural world. Plant material is required in all photographs.
- 9. Photographs must be mounted on black foam core and may not be over-matted. Overall dimension of entry must be a minimum of 36" and not exceed 50" in total perimeter measurement. Glass and framing are not permitted.
- 10. Each entry must have the entry form affixed to the back of the photograph mounting with the exhibitor's name, address, phone number and class entered. The top of the photograph must be indicated.
- 11. The division chairman will provide an entry card to be staged with each photograph. Identification of plant material on the entry card is not required but encouraged whenever possible.
- 12. An optional title or brief statement may be included on the entry form and the entry card itself not to exceed 25 words.

- 13. Photographs will be hung against a white background painted Sherwin-Williams 8565 "Simply White" semi-gloss.
- 14. Photographs must be received no later than February 17, 2022. Send or deliver photographs to: Kathleen Brown

- 15. All photographs will be passed by the photography committee to verify that class specifications have been met. If a photograph is not passed, the exhibitor will be notified and allowed, if time permits, to send a replacement photograph.
- 16. Only appropriate images of a child or children should be submitted to, passed and exhibited in the Photography Division and published in *focus*.
- 17. The scale of points by which the classes are to be judged is as follows:

Class 1 Easy Come, Easy Go 4 Entries A close-up, color image of a fading bloom

Educational Note: Close-up is a photo taken close to the subject or with a long focal-length lens to permit a close and detailed view of the object. The object fills most of the frame. - GCA FS&JG, July 2020 Edition

Class 2 It's so Easy to Fall in Love 4 Entries
A color image of a favorite landscape

Educational Note: Landscape is a view of the scenery, of any kind from wilderness vistas to urban cityscapes, land or sea. Primary subject is the scenery and it must dominate although the image may contain secondary elements such as people, animals or objects. City elements predominate in cityscapes; sea predominates in seascapes. - GCA FS&JG, July 2020 Edition

Division IV Easy to Assemble Botanical Arts Guidelines

- Please carefully read and follow the GCA Rules, General Information and the Timetable for Exhibitors.
- 2. Exhibitors are permitted only one exhibit in each class but may enter more than one class. All participants must be listed on the entry card. Registration closes for LRGC members January 20, 2022. Exhibitors will be notified if accepted or not at the time of registration
- 3. If forced to withdraw, the exhibitor must notify the division chairman and the class consultant and find a substitute unless there is a waiting list for the class.
- 4. All plant material used must be **dried** this includes flowers, foliage, seeds, pods, nuts (in or out of shells), vegetables, twigs, vines, reeds, etc. Only plant material, mechanics and their surface treatments (i.e. paints, nail polishes, varnishes, waxes, etc.) are permitted. Artificial, endangered, and locally invasive plant material may not be used.
- 5. Figural forms must be assembled or judiciously carved by the exhibitor. Any plant material may be cut, incised, or shaped to enhance artistic effect.
- Non-plant material (i.e. cardboard, metal, twine, string, cording, etc.) may be used only for construction and must not show.

- 7. Each entry must be the work of the exhibitor under whose name it is registered. No more than two exhibitors may execute a botanical arts entry unless otherwise stated in the schedule. All handiwork must be executed by the exhibitor.
- 8. Processed products may not be included in design (e.g., couscous, pasta, tapioca, balsa wood.)
- 9. A sample card must accompany each entry. An untreated sample of each plant material used in the design, correctly identified with botanical and common names using a black, waterproof medium, should be affixed to a 5" x 7" white, unlined card(s).
- 10. An optional title or brief statement may be included on the entry form and the entry card itself not to exceed 25 words.
- 11. All entries must be received no later than February 24, 2022. Send or deliver entries to:

12. If an exhibit has won first place or a GCA Special Award in a GCA Flower Show, GCA Major Flower Show, or Sanctioned Non-GCA Major Flower Show it may not be entered in competition again. An exhibit which has been previously entered and did not place

first may be entered again if the piece is significantly altered.

- 13. All entries will be passed by the botanical arts committee to verify class specifications have been met. If time permits, an entry may be returned for correction.
- 14. The committee will be responsible for installation of the exhibits. The exhibitor may install their own work, if desired. Each exhibit will be handled with the utmost care. Indicate in writing, and include with the exhibit, any special instructions for handling and display.

DIVISION IV Easy to Assemble Botanical Arts Classes

Class 1 It's a Cinch 4 Entries

Create a brooch. Entries will be staged on one-half of a 30" diameter round table 30" high covered with a black tablecloth. Entries will be placed upon a 9" flat black cube in front of a black background. Judged from above. Brooch must be able to lie flat for display. Do not use a fastener on the back. Brooch base will be provided to entrants.

Botanical jewelry is a design created entirely from dried plant material and made to resemble wearable jewelry in both size and function. No mechanics or structural base material may be visible - GCA FS&JG, July 2020 Edition

Class 2 Easy Money 4 Entries

Embellish a coin purse. Entries will be staged on one-half of a 30" diameter round table 42" high covered in a black tablecloth. Entries will be displayed upon a mannequin hand placed upon a 2" tall 5" square black wooden block in front of a black background. Judged from all sides. Coin purses and mannequin hands will be provided to entrants. Mannequin hands may not be painted or otherwise altered and must be returned in the condition received.

Educational Note: Botanical embellishment is a man-made object enhanced with dried plant material. Materials may be artificially treated. Complete coverage of the object is not required, unless stated in a flower show schedule. - GCA FS&JG, July 2020 Edition
