Fantastic Flower Show Prep Information From Robin Orsi and Susan Davis

Grooming Kit for Hort

- · Clippers, large enough to cut branch stem, or a sharp pocket knife
- · Clippers, small enough to trim the edge of a leaf, such as nail scissors
- Tweezers
- Small brushes like make-up brushes or small paint brushes
- · Small bottle of alcohol
- Green and brown markers for covering small imperfections on leaf or stem
- · Q-tips and/or cotton balls for cleaning
- · Small spray bottle for water
- Extra packet of floral life or other food.
 Vodka works, too.
- Tape measure
- Magnifying glass
- Flashlight
- · Small funnel for pouring water into your show container

Label your equipment. It all looks alike and if yours is borrowed, it will come home if you have marked it. A labeler works; so does nail polish.

Preparing for a show

- 1. Read the schedule
- 2. Select your specimen
 - 3. Condition
 - 4. Groom
- 5. Container and wedging
 - 6. Name your entry



Flower Show Lingo

The <u>Schedule</u> - the blueprint for the show, including all the rules and requirements, necessary timetables, and all the classes in each division. It also lists the available awards and entry forms necessary for that particular show.

<u>Divisions</u> - A flower show is organized around the show disciplines, which form divisions, including floral design, horticulture, photography, botanical arts, and conservation, education, and garden history and design exhibits.

<u>Classes</u> - The categories within the divisions, organized with similar characteristics. The horticulture division might have a class of cut annual flowering stems or a class of succulents in a 6" container, for example.

<u>Conditioning</u> - preparing specimens to make them last longer for the show, such as putting them in water overnight, or adding floral preservative or other methods. My favorite reference for this is Joanne Lenden's *Flowers for Bouquets*, which is useful for horticulture as well as for floral designers. Order at www.Lenden.com.

<u>Growing conditions</u>- whether the specimen was grown indoors or out, in sun or shade, under grow lights or some combination. Include if the plant was fertilized and how watered - by sprinkler or by Mother Nature, etc.

<u>Grooming</u> - Cleaning up your specimen for the party. Just as you clean up, take a bath, brush off the lint, etc., plants must be pest free, dead leaves removed, dust and other debris removed - from the front and back of the leaves. No artificial aids to make leaves look shiny are allowed.

Identification - Naming your plant. You may only know the common name, but that is the starting point for finding out the proper Latin botanical name, and if possible, the cultivar. For example, the common name may be Rose, but the Latin name is Rosa, the cultivar could be 'New Dawn'. This is when Google is your friend, or the A to Z Encyclopedia of Garden Plants, or garden catalogs with pictures, www.missouribotanicalgarden.org (or www.mobot.org), other web sites for nurseries, etc.

Key Card - usually a blank 4 x 6 index card, which you use to draw a small diagram of a group of plants in the same container. By numbering each plant in the diagram, you can then fill out the necessary genus and species information for each plant in the group. The schedule will tell you when a key card is required for a certain class.

<u>Propagation</u> - one of several methods of creating new plants. You can plant from seed, divide a clump to make new ones, grow from a cutting, or air layer. The propagation card simply describes the method you used and most importantly, the dates you started, fertilized, repotted etc., as well as the growing conditions. Buying a plant from a nursery and planting it in your garden is NOT propagation.

<u>Passers</u> - judges or other experts who check your entry to make sure that there are no pests, debris, or dead bits that need to be removed. They also check for proper naming on the entry card and verify the entry has been entered in the right class. Passers are there to help YOU, the entrant.

<u>Specimen</u> - the entry for the show in horticulture, whether it is a flower, a branch, a leaf, or other cutting from your garden. In hort, you can enter both cut specimens and container plants, which are plants in soil in a pot.

The Yellow Book – The Flower Show and Judging Guide, published by GCA, and used to plan and execute a flower show. The Yellow Book (which is actually a group of 5 books) includes everything from the steps to plan the show to the scoring methods judges use. Refer to the Yellow Book to see the criteria for judging particular hort specimens. It also includes how all other Divisions are judged. It is a wealth of information when planning a show or entering a show in any Division and can be found on the Flower Show landing page on the GCA website.

Mr. Hill (for himself and Mrs. Dingell) submitted the following resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Oversight and Reform

RESOLUTION

Recognizing and celebrating the 200th anniversary of the birth of Frederick Law Olmsted.

Whereas April 26, 2022, marks the 200th anniversary of the birth of Frederick Law Olmsted;

Whereas Olmsted was an author, journalist, public official, city planner, landscape architect, and innovator who shaped the American landscape;

Whereas Olmsted influenced and designed beautiful and functional landscapes, including Central Park in New York City and other major urban parks and park systems, the United States Capitol Grounds, several State capitals, estates, college campuses, and recreation areas;

Whereas Olmsted is remembered as the premier landscape architect in the United States during the 19th century and 2

is considered to be the founder of landscape architecture in the United States;

Whereas Olmsted was one of the first individuals to promote the idea of national parks in his 1865 Yosemite Report;

Whereas Olmsted believed that thoughtful landscape designs promote community, advance democracy, provide recreational opportunities in urban environments, nurture and invigorate public health, and encourage the development of livable communities;

Whereas Olmsted's sons, associates, and successor firms carried out his philosophy and designs well into the 20th century, including establishing the American Society of Landscape Architects, leaving a tremendous legacy of historic landscapes that continues to benefit the people of the United States and visitors throughout the world;

Whereas Olmsted inspired the development of large parks and park systems for public benefit in urban areas, creating a legacy of parks that are a singular feature of the urban experience; and

Whereas Olmsted's landscape designs play a vital role in the enrichment of States across the country and contribute to the quality of life in hundreds of communities across the country: Now, therefore, be it

PROCLAMATION

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS COME - GREETINGS:

WHEREAS: Frederick Law Olmsted was born on April 26, 1822, in Hartford, Connecticut. He developed a love and appreciation for nature early on in his life, traits that would inscribe themselves onto the landscape of our nation; and

WHEREAS: Although accepted into Yale College, Olmsted was unable to complete his studies and instead spent much of his time traveling and working around the world. These experiences had a significant impact on Olmsted's later designs; and

WHEREAS: Olmsted became superintendent of Central Park in New York City in 1857 and was joined by Calvert Vaux in preparing the winning submission for the design competition of Central Park; and

WHEREAS: Upon the outbreak of the Civil War, Olmsted left New York to serve as the first Executive Secretary of the United States Sanitary Commission, a forerunner to the American Red Cross. As Secretary, he spearheaded multiple health initiatives, including proper sanitation and good nutrition, and led the movement to repurpose military boats into medical ships, thereby saving countless lives; and

WHEREAS: In 1863, Olmsted moved to California to manage the Mariposa Estate and surrounding gold mines. There, he was asked to head a commission to oversee the newly established Yosemite Reservation. An avid conservationist, Olmsted's efforts helped lay the foundation for the National Park Service; and

WHEREAS: Olmsted frequently discussed the role of landscapes to the human condition. He stressed the importance of restorative areas, such as parks, to human health and environmental protection. According to Olmsted, parks were intended for everyone, regardless of race or class, and therefore served as democratic spaces. He would go on to design various parks, college campuses, and urban areas including Prospect Park, Stanford University, and the areas surrounding the United States Capitol; and

WHEREAS: As the Natural State and home to numerous national parks, Olmsted's influence on environmental protection has been essential to the preservation of Arkansas's namesake, and it is important to acknowledge the contributions he has made to

NOW, THEREFORE, I, ASA HUTCHINSON, Governor of the State of Arkansas, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the laws of the State of Arkansas, do hereby proclaim April 26th, 2022, as

FREDERICK LAW OLMSTED DAY IN ARKANSAS

and I encourage everyone to recognize Olmsted's legacy within landscape architecture and ecological conservation.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State of Arkansas to be affixed this 14th day of April, in the year of our Lord 2022.





NEW PROJECT/GCA GRANT: THE COVEY AT GILLAM PARK



Congratulations to The Covey at Gillam Park!

Winner of one of the five \$10,000
GCA Common Ground Collaborative Grants
For the LRGC GCA P4P Project

The Covey at Gillam Park was awarded the grant at the Awards Ceremony at the GCA Annual Meeting, Friday, April 29, 2022.

The Common Ground Collaborative Grant was created to support GCA member clubs in building long-term relationships with diverse community groups to develop, improve, and maintain public land and programs.

The Covey at Gillam Park is a collaborative community effort with the LRGC, AGFC, ANHC, Audubon Arkansas, Central Arkansas Water, Quail Forever, The Nature Conservancy and welcoming our new partner ACCESS School.

The thirty-acre oak savannah hosts a perfect 7.5 acres to be restored to native prairie. THE COVEY will work with partner agencies on site preparation, prescribed burns, and removing invasive plants. Then we will collect, clean, and plant seed. A community looking to host Bobwhite Quail, Monarch Butterflies and Pollinators....

Audubon Arkansas is also giving an in-kind match of \$10,000!
